

SECOND GRADE

THIRD GRADE

The 1980/81 season saw the third grade finish in third position. This enabled them to reach the semi-final which they unfortunately lost to Claremont-Cottesloe.

In the final analysis it was our inconsistency with the bat that cost us a place in the final. The team had a number of "potentially" good batsmen who failed to produce any big scores throughout the season. Because of this we regularly bowled at low targets. The general standard of batting was not good enough to put pressure on the 2nd grade batsmen which is not a healthy situation. During the season only one player "amassed" over 300 runs, Ross Bolton 310 and 3 other over 200, John Fitzgerald 287, D Shilbury 259, and Tony Mazza 207. Dennis Medley was in and out of various teams throughout the season but finally settled for third grade. Dennis has proved he is a very capable third grade bat and with a little time and effort should be a regular member of the second grade side. Dennis scored 164 runs from 7 innings at an average of 32.80. In the end John Fitzgerald took out the third grade batting average 28.70. John relished the opportunity of a drop down the list, as well as his younger brother looking like scoring more runs than him, to finish the season with some big scores.

On the credit side, the teams bowling efforts were nothing short of outstanding regularly bowling sides out for under 150. A newcomer to the club this year 'Bluey' (Hook and Slice) Parker added pace and fire to our attack. On many occassions it was noted that not many of the opposition batsmen were particularly interested especially on a bouncy Alderbury wicket, not to mention the slips standing on Oceanic Drive. Brad took 30 wickets. However the real star with the ball was Phil Hayden who finally put his mind to taking wickets and that he did 32 at an average of 9.12 including a haul of 7-12 and 6-22.

Phil was rewarded by promotion to seconds and eventually a Toyota match before entering matrimonial bliss at the peak of his career. These two were well supported by Dave Phillips 23 wickets (who found a few more unknown muscles during the season) Dave Raven 16, D. Shilling 15 and Spud Tate 15 who impressed us with his own variety of leggies as well as taking a 'catch'. Spud will no doubt put plenty of pressure on the selectors for a position in second grade next season.

If the bowling was good then it was generally matched by an impressive display of fielding throughout. The concentration levels of some also improved as the year porgressed. The team had a number of keepers over the season with backstop Bolton taking 15 catches (one which should have been mine), the veteran of third grade Peaky Mazza showed early form in taking 16 catches while young Mark Hudson and Greg Fitzgerald show plenty of promise with the gloves. The importance of batting skills together with keeping will become very important.

To conclude I would like to thank all those players who played thirds this year for the support they gave me both at training and during matches.

I've no doubt we will again be big contenders for the flag next season.

ANNUAL REPORT 1981

It is my pleasure to report that once again, the Junior Section of the Club has increased the number of its teams in the field from 36 in 1979/80 to 40 for the 1980/81 season. It is flattering to note that adjoining Clubs have asked permission to place teams in our competitions because of having not sufficient strength in their own, for example Nedlands have two teams playing in our Under 14 Grade and Claremont-Cottesloe one, while Scarborough has one team in our Club District Uner 16 competition.

Already there is promise of additional growth for the 1981/82 season as Scarborough have asked approval to include three teams, instead of one, in our Under 16 local competition while Woodlands, which is now in Subiaco-Floreat territory instead of Scarborough's, will transfer at least one Under 12 and an Under 14 side to us at the beginning of next season. The Subiaco Police Boys Club hope to increase their single team which started last season to about four.

So junior teams in the Subiaco area are gradually developing as the Police Boys teams will be added to the two teams from Jolimont and one, named Subiaco, which comes from the Shenton Park-Wembley locality.

With these, and hopefully other teams we should reach the half century next season.

The winners of the various Shields were well distributed throughout the District which shows the game is played in a very competitive spirit which is good to see with Marist Black winning the Under 16 Richie Hann Trophy, Wembley Downs the Under 14 Maroon Frank Bird Perpetual Shield, Marist Blue the Under 14 Gold Ray Young Perpetual Shield, Subiaco - Floreat the Under 12A Waldo Turner Perpetual Shield, and City Beach Black the Under 12B Floreat Park Junior Cricket association Shield.

The thanks of myself and members of the Junior Council must go to the Perth City Council, the Stirling City Council, the Subiaco City Council and to Newman College, Hale School, and the University of Western Australia as well as the Jolimont and City Beach Primary Schools for the use of their wickets, and facilities, and thanks also for the support and encouragement of senior members of the Club, particularly Richie Hann, who as our extremely busy President always made himself available for advice and assistance whenever required.

In conclusion it is to be regretted that we were not able to repeat the previous seasons success in winning the McKenzie Shield because it is these W.A.C.A. Competitors that give the Club prestige. However in all age groups we were never lower than second place on the points table and it will be our aim to put Subiaco-Floreat on top for the 1981/82 season.

There is no doubt that if Marty continues to work on his games as he has done he will be right up there in a few years time. Paul Osborne 21 and Steven Neiken 18 offered good support with the new hall.

The fielding standard would do credit to any of our senior teams. Their disciplined approach especially when things got a bit tough was outstanding.

One of the young boys was eventually selected in the third grade side. This was because of his consistency shown with the bat as an opener and wicket keeping ability.

The boy was Greg Fitzgerald who scored 379 runs from 11 innings and took 20 catches and 2 stumpings during the season. This earned him the award of U/16 'Cricketer of the Year'.
