#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Where did we go wrong in the 1981/2 Cricket Season? That is the question that should be asked of the Club as a whole. Before the season commenced, we were faced with the expulsion of our 5th and 6th Grade Teams from the Suburban Turf Competition. This left us with the four traditional W.A.C.A. sides but deprived us of a nucleus of enthusiastic young lads just waiting for the opportunity to play grade cricket.

The Season commenced well with two "A" Grade wins in the first two games. However, from the third fixture on, we had trouble clinching a win. We had many close calls and could well have finished in a better position on the table. It is history that we finished down the list after being runners-up in 1980/81. Our only direction now is upwards and I would like to think that we have all learnt from the past season, and that we will approach next season with enthusiasm and a determination to succeed. To all who played in the "A" Grade side, I give my thanks for their efforts during the season. My hope is that they are rewarded in the seasons to come.

In a season of gloom two exciting young players emerged in Brian Raven and Greg Fitzgerald. Veteran Kevan Penter won the batting and bowling averages.

It is fair to say that the second and third grades were affected by the fact that the "A" Grade Team was not stabilised into a composite unit. The movement of players up and down the grades had a disturbing effect on the second and third grades. Other teams had their chances and finished in middle order premiership table positions. A highlight of these grades was the emergence of Todd Breman as a player of the future. After a successful opening in thirds, he made a century in his first second grade appearance. He also honoured the club by being appointed Captain of the Under 16 State Team.

The Fourth Grade emerged as our most successful team. Under the wily captaincy of Dave Phillips, they easily won their Semi Final against Nedlands only to go down to University in a tense final. The team was a mixture of youth and experience and their professional approach to the game could well be studied by the more senior grades.

The Club was further honoured by the success of Kim Hughes and Terry Alderman on the State and International scene. We congratulate Kim on his appointment as Australian Captain for the Pakistan Tour and Terry on his performances and the winning of the W.A. Sportsmen of the Year award and the Sheraton Gold Cup.

Our four Captains and our Selection Committee deserve a vote of thanks in a difficult season. To Glen Hughes, Reg Statham, David Shilbury, David Phillips and Alan Bolton - thanks for the time and effort you have put in.

To my Committee who have worked so well during the year I extend my thanks. It is rather a paradox in a year that the Committee functioned smoothly and controlled their finances so well that our performances on field were not up to our normal expectations.

Might I challenge all club members to put their shoulder to the wheel and through hard work and co-operation, return the club to its former standing. Remember the old saying "United we stand - Divided we fall".

For my past I am grateful for the opportunity for serving you as President of a club steeped in tradition and look forward to a successful season 1982/83. I am confident - are you?

### CAPTAINS REPORT

#### FIRST GRADE

The 1981-82 season has been one of great disappointment. After finishing on top of the Premiership Table last season we finished on the bottom this year.

The loss of Kevin Sharp from last year's side and the limited availability of Kim Hughes, Terry Alderman and Giles Bush, certainly left very large gaps in the side. These gaps proved to be too big to fill.

A promising start was made to the season with victories in the first two matches. However, the signs were already pointing up a major problem area for the team, its batting. It was only through excellent bowling and some good "backs-to-the wall" batting by two or three players that saw the side to victory in these matches.

One batting failure after another was the story for the rest of the season. Only in the second last game did the side pass the 200 run mark again. This was the side's only other win. Our opponents also had trouble reaching 200 runs which is a tribute to the bowlers.

Three bowlers shared the bulk of the wickets between them. Brian Raven showed great improvement taking 31 wickets, while the evergreen Ian King again took wickets when they were most needed to finish the season with 27. Kevan Penter showed the value of accurate bowling and a little movement by taking 25 wickets at the good average of 14.68.

Other good features of the season included Peter Jones admirable job both behind the stumps and with the bat and the emergence of Greg Fitzgerald as a player with a bright future.

If 1982-83 is to be successful a change in attitude is needed by most players. A big effort will be needed at practice and a strong will to win will need to be developed.

### CAPTAINS REPORT

### THIRD GRADE

The 1981/82 season saw the third grade side eventually finish in seventh position. During the season we had ample opportunity to push our way into the four, however, lack of experience together with mental concentration and determination eventually cost us that chance to play finals.

This season saw many young players enter grade ranks and with this year behind them should begin to develop their mental abilities to levels matching their cricket skills. Of the younger players forcing their way into the 3rds this year, two stood out showing enormous abilities whether batting or bowling. I refer to Todd Breman and Martin Croft. I have no doubt both will move up the grades in coming seasons.

The batting department again highlighted a general club weakness with only three players showing any real consistency. Ross Bolton (280 runs), Todd Breman (285) and David Shilbury (258) were three players showing an ability to occupy the crease under a variety of conditions. Ross Bolton eventually won the averages, with an average of 39.

The bowling department showed a trend towards the spin departments. Dave Shilbury (27 wickets) with a special brand of darts, headed the averages (11.96) with Martin Croft showing a great deal of variation and control with his off spinners. One of the major benefits for the

club this year was the return of Muzza Raven. No doubt Murray will work his way up the grades next year. Murray was well supported in the medium pace department by Wild Bill who bowled as well as he ever has, but without much luck. The big "praying-mantis" Mal Gibson also showed enormous improvement this year bowling with good line and length. On top of those bowlers Todd Breman and Trevor Sanders in the latter half of the year bowled well.

In the fielding department special mention should be made of Ross Bolton's iron glove work. Ross was forced to take the gloves and performed exceptionally well.

In concluding I would like to thank all players for their support this year and in particular I would like to thank my Vice Captain Ross Bolton for taking over as captain in the last three games.

## JUNIOR COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT

As usual the Junior Competition of the Club, under the administration of the Junior Council, was carried through to completion with its normal efficiency. This was aided by the fact that most Delegates have been in office for at least three years.

42 teams competed in Under 16, 14 and 12 year grades. One of the things that is worth noting is that throughout the season we have the use of twenty one wickets, so that all juniors are ensured of a game. We are able to accommodate approximately 500 boys.

Each season we acquire new wickets. In 1981/82 we gained the use of Woodlands Reserve, Henderson Park and Brittania Reserve.

Our local Under 16 Competition for the Richie Hann Shield was won by Marist Blue. The Ray Young Shield for the Under 14 Gold Competition was won by Woodlands who were transferred to Subiaco-Floreat from Scarborough by the W.A.C.A. The newly formed Floreat Junior Cricket Club

won the Frank Bird Shield in the Under 14 Maroon Competition.

Marist Blue won the 12A (theoretically 11 year olds)
Turner Shield and Subiaco Police Boys were successful in
winning the original Floreat Park Junior Cricket Club
Shield in the 12B Competition (for 8 to 10 year olds).

From the above it can be seen that the shields were won by Clubs from a wide area. 1981/82 was the closest competition ever and in three grades a place in the final four was decided on percentages.

I feel that the Club can say with pride that we have more boys playing cricket than play any other summer sport. Next to Wanneroo we have the second largest junior competition in the W.A.C.A.

My thanks go to members of the Junior Council, to parents, the Club's Senior Committee and all those who have helped to make this a most successful season.

All in all a lot was learnt and achieved and the boys are to be complimented on the way they play the game in fine spirit.
