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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I see a future President in the making here. Alan Bolton and John Wade continued as Vice Presidents and handled their respective portfolios with aplomb. Believe-you-me, it is very helpful for a President to have such energetic Vice Presidents, Geoff Hann, Treasurer, Richard Tredget, Secretary, and Peter Williams, W.A.C.A. Delegate all handled their duties in a very capable way. Of the Committee Members, mention should be made of Bruce Klein, Social, and David McKay, Juniors. Both members will not be available for Committee duties next season and this will leave a gap in our ranks.

Club Captains

To the Fourth Grade Captains I extend my congratulations to a job well done. Peter "Plug" Jones improved as the season went on and fully accepted his responsibility as "A" Grade Captain. The determination of Alan was exemplified when he sent young John Gillam back on to the field in the Fourth Grade Semi-Final after Gillam had been felled by a bouncer. A drink of water was produced as the only solace for the young "Cowboy". "Get out there and get your heart muscle going" said Al. As Dennis Franks remarked later on, he thought that Alan was going to drink the water. Al was rewarded with a Fourth Grade Pennant. Two in a row - not bad.

They can look back on the year with the satisfaction that no other Colts team can better their record. You can only win all your games.

Juniors

During the season the Club took the opportunity to formalise the Junior Cricket body as a separate Committee with certain powers of their own. Frank Pelusey took the reins as Chairman of the Junior Committee and as a representative on the Senior Committee. Thanks Frank for your assistance in bringing the Junior Committee closer to the senior body. Waldo Turner was appointed Secretary of the Junior Committee and I thank Waldo for his fine efforts over a number of years.

Social

There is a separate social report, so I will not go into this aspect in detail. Suffice to say that the innovation of the white board (and its grafitti), the cabaret and wind up at the Bowling Club and the after game drinks were all very enjoyable and played a big part in club spirit. This team spirit was exemplified by the Fourth Grade team who, after winning their final at Fremantle journeyed all the way to Lilac Park to support the Third Grade in their efforts to win a flag.

All the club members hope that he is back on the field next year.

Thanks to all. The roster worked smoothly and I can't remember when one lady didn't turn up or not arrange a substitute. Truly a magnificent effort by all the ladies in the club. It has been suggested that the ladies might like to form a sub-committee within the framework of the Club.

Future

We are a young club. By that I mean our players are young. I have heard it said that the youth of today are our leaders of tomorrow. In our case, they are the leaders and players of today. The experience gained by having four teams in W.A.C.A. finals will toughen these youngsters for the coming season. We have a nice blend of senior players in all grades. We did well this season, but this must be our bottom line for next season. Every member - on and off the field - must aim to raise the Club's banner even higher next year. To the young players I ask for a full commitment to off season training and to club practice when the season gets under way. You won't improve your cricket if you expect to get your practice on Saturday out in the middle. It just doesn't work.

SUBIACO-FLOREAT CRICKET CLUB/FUNDING REPORT

Financially, the Committee believes that the Club achieved satisfactory results for the year. Apart from a handful of players, who continue to involve the Committee in negative and wasteful internal pursuit of players' subscriptions, fundraising from other areas permitted the Club to invest in new assets and institute new ideas.

1983/84 Season - Achievements

The season began with the first ever pre-season training camp for the "A" Grade squad, which on all accounts proved to be highly successful. This, of course, required funding by the Club, however, the Committee was of the opinion that the expenditure involved was well worth the results achieved.

The Committee also decided to invest in coaching aids and as a consequence of this decision a bowling machine was purchased and installed for the use of players. A donation of \$500 towards this project was kindly made by Kimberley N.Z.I. Finance Ltd.

It was also decided to invest in a video camera, recorder and colour t.v. set, not only as coaching aids, but also as a means of providing entertainment for the Club membership. Valuable assistance in the purchase of this equipment was provided by Lester Barnes, through his association with Ramsey's, the electrical retailers in Subiaco.

As a result of these purchases, the Club applied for, and received, an equipment grant from the Department of Youth Sport and Recreation, amounting to \$1,300. This was an unexpected bonus, however, the Committee will be looking to take full advantage of the Department's financial assistance for future development projects.

Harold Christensen, a partner in the stockbroking firm of R.M. Black & Associates, kindly donated \$500 towards the provision of subsidised track suits for the "A" Grade cricket squad. The intention being to present the players as a uniform and cohesive representation of the Club, not only at "A" Grade games, but also at training sessions.

This year the Club was also successful in gaining Brownes Dairy through the promotion of their Brownes Lite Chocmilk, to sponsor the junior coaching clinic, which from all accounts proved to be most satisfactory. Congratulations must be extended to David Shilbury and David McKay, for their efforts in organising the coaching clinic.

Once again, Town and Country W.A. Building Society supported the Club by agreeing to sponsor the construction of the mobile notice board that now not only graces our premises, but near enough occupies the entire pavillion! The Committee feels that this is a valuable and useful addition to the Club's facilities. A sincere thank you to the Town and Country W.A. Building Society.

For several years now the La Cassetta Restaurant in Cambridge Street, Wembley, has provided the "A" Grade Player of the Match Awards, representing meal vouchers. This year they were joined by the Fairway Tavern, who also made available meal vouchers. These are very popular prizes and the Committee looks forward to maintaining the Club's strong association with these sponsors.



Despite some players being extremely slow in returning proceeds from the sale of the chocolates, the Committee was pleased with the cholcolates as a fundraising medium, as total sales produced a profit of \$416 for the Club.

During the year, the Club also entered into the computer age, by having all its playing and non-playing members mailing lists computerised, which now enables more numerous and faster circularisation of the Club's membership for the distribution of the Club Newsletter, notices of social events and any other material that may be required to be posted.

The Future

One of the difficulties in providing adequate funds for the successful running of a cricket club is in finding sufficient social, non-playing members.

In the past season an effort was made to offer more benefits to the non-playing membership via the Businessmen's Club, as an alternative to offering just non-playing membership. The Businessmen's Club membership extended several benefits over and above non-playing membership, the major benefit being a discount of 10% on all meals and drinks at the Red Castle Motor Hotel, through utilisation of their two restaurants.

Although the Club was not inundated with membership, applications that were received were pleasing.

The Committee is acutely aware that unless the Club can provide suitable social facilities, then the prospect of achieving a high level of non-playing membership will be difficult.

The Committee has initiated action with a view to improving social facilities during the past season and has earmarked the 1984/85 year as a year for achieving tangible improvements in this area. This will not be an easy task as it will require considerable funds and as such there will be a need for both playing and non-playing members to support the Club more fully in its fundraising activities next season. The membership of a club can only expect to take from it what it is prepared to put back.

The task of fund raising next season will be all that more difficult due to the loss of the valuable sponsorship that the Club has enjoyed from Griffin Coal over the past couple of years. Due to a change of control in the ownership of this company, they have advised that they will be no longer looking to sponsor the Cluband its activities.

Our sincere thank you for their past support.

Finally both the playing and non-playing membership of the Club must develop an awareness of the difficulties associated with funding a successful sporting body.

The Club is virtually a small business with an annual turnover of funds exceeding \$23,000 during the last season.

This money does not appear from nowhere, but comes about as a result of some hard work carried out by a few people. If the Club membership wants better playing and social facilities, then every member is going to have to contribute some effort and assistance in future fund raising programmes.







SOCIAL REPORT

1ST GRADE REPORT

If one was not to look closely at the statistics of the season, I'm sure that most people, as I do, would consider that the season was far from a disappointing one. There were a number of reasons for arriving at this conclusion - reasons that augur well for the steady improvement in the first team, making it a competitive final four prospect for a number of seasons.

The season commenced with a team that was obviously very strong, comprising State squad members Kim Hughes, Terry Alderman and Brian Raven, as well as very experienced players in Travers, Mulhall, Hann, Jones, Lubich. One person not in that first team was to prove a match winner and a player of obvious first class ability.

Well, the above team was not to be maintained througout the season. Terry Alderman made a successful return to first class cricket; Brian Raven discontinued playing with a recurring back injury, Brad Parker and Wayne Hicks withdrew for a period of time. Hence it was necessary to introduce players who had either not played "A" Grade or players with only a few games - and I believe this was our greatest success. All players, with the exception of one, were young and the elder statesman of the team in the last game of the season provided one of the best batting displays I have seen whilst playing "A" Grade.

I suppose it is necessary to cut the Hitchcock stuff and name these players who combined to make an enjoyable 1983/84 season.

My congratulations go to Giles Bush who, after missing the first game of the season, captured the highest aggregate of wickets, provided encouragement and moved with speed and gusto in the field. Giles took 54 wickets at a brilliant average of 16.92, having bowled 353.5 overs. Many of these wickets were upper order batsmen, which lends support to Giles being a bowler of class.

Steve Mulhall also gave an exceptional performance throughout the season. Always having the ability to place the game in our favour off his own bat, I consider that this particular success eluded him previously, due to impetuosity and an over flamboyance in stroke play. Steve's best innings was a 77 against Fremantle, which included 39 singles. Steve concluded the season with 675 runs at the very good average of 47.

Our opening positions were always difficult to fill - only one player had success, Geoff Hann. Geoff scored 456 runs at 30.40, which included one of the few centuries of the season, 109 against Perth. His fielding proved valuable in a team that was not endowed with many nimble movers. I have one criticism - that I did not use Geoff more as a bowler.

A new player to Subi-Floreat this season was Craig Lubich - a confident, garrulous person. Craig bowled tirelessly from one end on many occasions - the final game of the season being pertinent - bowling about 38 overs and capturing 7 wickets. Craig would probably agree with me that he did not realise his potential with the bat, however, his contribution in the season was noteworthy.

The 1983/84 season saw the emergence of some fine young cricketers, in John Hurst, without doubt one of the keenest cricketers (and worst dressed, with a weird sense of humour) I have seen for some seasons. Steve Neilsen also fits the above category. Steve took on the task of opening bowler with a desire to learn and to play "A" Grade for many seasons, and I am sure he will.



Greg Fitzgerald gradually displayed the potential he possesses and with another season should develop greater confidence and aggression in his game. Steve Wright has a lot of ability and sadly it has taken him a couple of seasons longer than many people thought it would for him to be a good "A" Grade cricketer.

The elder statesman mentioned earlier is Peter Carlstein. Peter played the last three games of the season. His century (101) against Midland-Guildford was a delight to watch and an education for all. I thank Peter for the many conversations that gave me advice and confidence.

I complete my report in thanking all players, the Committee, the women who assisted with afternoon tea, and a very special thank you to Graham Lees.

3RD GRADE REPORT

JUNIOR COUNCIL REPORT

The recently completed season saw some thirty teams contest this year's club competition in U/12 and U/14 age group. The results were as follows:-

Unfortunately the U/16 competition failed to materialise due to lack of teams, there being only three nominations – one less than last year. Two clubs managed to place their sides in outside fixtures, whilst the third played a number of scratch matches throughout the metropolitan area. This occurrence was the most unfortunate aspect of the 83/84 juniors season.

Representatives of each of the nine participating clubs met early in the season and recommended the formation of a formal Junior Council to control the affairs of under age club cricket within Subiaco Floreat area. The Management Committee ratified the proposal and guide lines were set. I believe this will solve many of the problems experienced at this level of cricket. There is little value in dwelling on problems of the past, other than to use the experience to set goals for the future.

The essential aim of the council is the organisation of junior cricket within our boundaries. The group is responsible for determining rules of play, arranging fixtures and grounds, accepting nominations and collecting application fees. The group autonomy allows for the formation of budgets and its own financial administration. In the event of any protest or dispute, the council will provide a resolution. Finally responsibility for fielding teams in the little league and shield competitions will be arranged by a committee of the Junior Council.

One delegate from each participating club provide the membership of the council together with a delegate from the Management Committee. From these numbers are elected a Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer. At present, Mr W. Turner has been co-opted to fill the role of Secretary giving a total number of eleven. Sub Committees have been structured with various responsibilities in order to gain full participation of members.

I am pleased to say the support shown by the Club for the council's plans has been unanimous and I am sure will lead to a smooth and expanded competition in 1984/85.
