Giles Bush won the Swan Brewery Award for the 'Bowling Aggregate' in 'A' Grade, and shared the Swan Brewery 'Champion Grade Player' for our Club with Chris Smailes.

Chris Smailes returned to the Club and Captained the side with distinction. "Plug" Jones played his 100th 1st Grade game - congratulations "Plug". Kim Hughes and Terry Alderman were available for more than the usual one game, and their presence on and off the field was much appreciated. May they both continue to grace the field, wearing the Subiaco-Floreat colours, for many years to come.

One very pleasing result of the season was the ability of the 1st Grade team to lift themselves from the bottom of the ladder to be a definite final four chance. The Club looks forward to the return of Glen Hughes for 1985/86 season.

An innovation for the season was the introduction of Lou Thompson as motivator for the Club - particularly at 1st Grade level. Thanks, Lou, for your assistance, and we look forward to seeing you next season.

On the administrative and social side, we made good progress. The ground and wicket at the Floreat Oval improved, and should be better again next season.

Our thanks go to Peter Luff of the Perth City Council and his foreman and groundstaff. Also, to Alan Bolton for his liaison with the Council. Vice President, Dennis Franks, excelled in the area of finance and sponsorship. He is also working very hard on renovations and upgrading of the Pavilion. Unfortunately, these matters take time, but I am sure Dennis will wear the Council down. Alan Bolton and John Wade continued as Vice Presidents, and handled their respective portfolios with aplomb. Richard Tredget did a man-size job as Secretary - he is also handy with a drill and screwdriver. Unfortunately we lost the services of Peter Williams and Phil Sanders due to transfers interstate. It is essential that all club members strive to encourage the talent we have within the Club, to ensure that this potential is reached in the years to come. By doing this, you will ensure that Subiaco-Floreat is a premier club in the W.A.C.A.

VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT - FUNDING

In last year's report, I pointed out that if the Club was to financially prosper, then it was necessary for the membership to contribute more of itself to fund-raising activities.

It was pleasing to note during the 1984/85 season, that the small band of dedicated club people, namely Greg Burgess, John Gillam, Anthony Mazza, Peter Jones, and Phil Sanders, combined their many social talents to put on what was a memorable Christmas Eve party.

Needless to say, we have all heard of the reports of "thousands" of people who queued for hours endeavouring to participate in the event.

This function was extremely successful financially, and congratulations are extended to those who contributed their time and effort to ensure that it was successful.

It was pleasing to have the Club's usual sponsors once again come to the fore; in particular, the Town & Country W.A. Building Society, Kimberley N.Z.I. Finance Ltd, the La Cassetta Restaurant, Gus's Pizza Bar, Ampol, Red Castle Motor Hotel, and R.M. Black & Associates (Stockbrokers).

It was also pleasing to recruit the sponsorship support during the season from Greg Maskiell of the Wembley Physiotherapy and Sports Injury Clinic, the Fortron Group of Companies through the efforts of Barry Hudson, the Floreat Wine Bine through the efforts of the Colts side, Slater Gartrell Sports, and the return of Ray Fitzgerald & Co. (Real Estate Agents).

Without the support of these businesses, the job of balancing the Club's accounts each year would be all the more difficult.

Although the Club did not commit itself to much in the way of capital expenditure during the year, apart from the purchase of new practise nets, funds have been provided for out of the current year's trading for future projects.

Reference to the Club's balance sheet would indicate that the Club's investment portfolio has increased dramatically, not only during this financial year, but also during the previous year.

These funds are primarily earmarked for renovation and modernisation works to the Sydney Cheek Pavilion.

No doubt most of you are aware that the Committee has been lobbying and negotiating with the City of Perth for some considerable time, for the right to carry out these works.

It has been a most frustrating and time-consuming exercise. However, the Council has now agreed to introduce the concept of management licences for sporting and community facilities, so that interested parties may apply for such licences to manage the facilities.

The Council has issued a 12 month licence to the West Coast Football Club, on the basis of a 6 month trial.

We have discussed the licence with the Committee of the Football Club, and have made them well aware of the fact that there are many parties who



have an interest in these licences, and that it is imperative that they conduct themselves in such a manner that they do not prejudice the prospects of any other bodies obtaining a licence.

Currently, the Committee is submitting another application to carry out the modernisation works to the Council, without awaiting the outcome of the trial period on the management licence.

Council has made it quite clear that all such costs will be at the expense of the Club, and it is because of this attitude that we have been investing our funds rather than undertaking any capital expenditure programmes, so that we are well on our way to being able to carry out the renovations as soon as Council agrees to our request.

It is hoped that an approval will be forthcoming and work will be able to be commenced during the winter months.

In conclusion, I thank the Club membership for what I consider to be an improved attitude towards commitment to club activities during the season, and I firmly believe that as soon as we can obtain the approval to carry out the necessary works to the Pavilion, then the level of social activity and non-playing membership can only increase, all to the betterment of the Club.

Obviously, we must attain a successful status at first class level for the Club to be regarded as a powerful force, and one that top-class players are keen to join and become part of the success story.

As a club member who participated in many attendances at mid-week training, I feel we lacked DRIVE to achieve what is available within all of us, namely our best possible performance "on the track".

Sure, club cricket is not what could be considered a professional game money-wise, but the competitive factors alone - achieving the maximum within club playing strength, and striving for total success against opposition - should be sufficient to bring about a total effort within one's full capabilities.

This does not appear to be a natural corollary - and it should be.

Many at training - and that is where success is fermented and should be directed on-path by capable administration - are content to "have a bowl and a bat", and then find a way of achieving reason for little other involvement in the harder, less attractive, areas of fielding and catching skills.

For success this is simply not good enough, will not achieve what the Club is seeking, and in the coming year will not be tolerated.

Whilst we are currently contemplating the addition of a physical education coach to our assets for the forthcoming year, be it known that this will be, if implemented, only supplementary to the following.

Our Club philosophy for the forthcoming season, from ground roots, will be broadly framed around:-

- a) The willingness of the individual to apply himself,
- b) set his own goals before season's official practice, and thereafter during training sessions,
- c) and the achievement of same.

These would appear to be standards that sound straightforward enough, but only those who fulfil the criteria will really appreciate the equation and reap the benefits therefrom.

The Club will set itself the task of supplying the best available expertise to supplement the abovementioned goals.

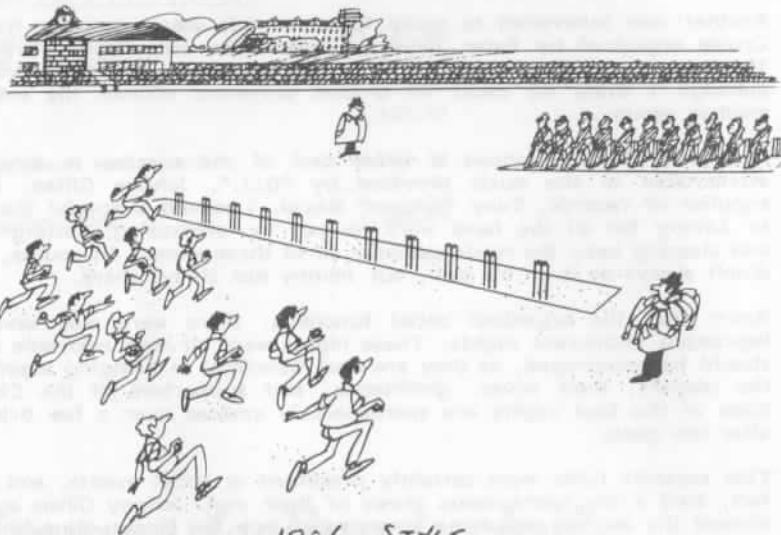

1ST GRADE REPORT

Having won the previous four games "on the trot" and needing to win the last three games of the 1984/85 season to secure a place in the final four, the 1st Grade side was looking good. A positive attitude pervaded throughout the side, and confidence was high. The fact that we lost those three games is history; but to say that we lost through lack of positive attitude is incorrect.

Attitude did not forsake the side over the last month, but good cricket did. Bad luck regarding the wicket at Melville, and plain poor batting against Southern Districts and Bayswater-Morley brought the season to a disappointing close.

However, I believe the players now know within themselves that they can combine to become a top 1st Grade side. That is half the battle. The other half, of course, is putting it into practice. Barring one or two exceptions, each player needs to adopt a more professional approach to his practice, with particular reference to his role in the side.

Being a virtual newcomer to the Club after an absence of several seasons, it is difficult for me to comment on whether certain players have shown improvement or otherwise. However, I was impressed with such players as Brian Raven, my captain of vice, for his excellent physical and mental dedication to his game throughout the season; Greg Fitzgerald, for exhibiting a high level of concentration on most occasions and dogged determination to succeed as an opener; and David Reed, for a remarkably mature attitude towards his batting, assisted by fine concentration. These are encouraging signs. In particular, these latter two young batsmen should be looking to score heavily in 1st Grade ranks next season.

Peter Jones, always professionally efficient, also managed to pull off a couple of miraculous catches during the season. Giles Bush again bowled extremely well. Although consistent throughout the season, I can recall one superb spell from Giles against Scarborough. His figures in that game of 29-16-2-31 did not reveal the true story. Giles worked hard at his cricket this year (and in the off-season), and has reaped his just rewards in again winning the 'Club Bowling Average', and more significantly, in gaining selection in the Sheffield Shield Team. I would hope that the example set by Giles will be followed by some of the younger members of the Club. Craig Lubich, although seemingly tireless and able to bowl from one end all day (if allowed), showed to me this season that some thought was coupled with his exertions, and flashed glimpses of being an astute tactician. His batting would no doubt benefit from a similar approach.

Phil Sanders, in his short stay in 1st Grade, played a couple of valuable innings, showing fine application in each. John Hurst's desire to improve his all-round game is commendable. He was one of the players that benefitted from the generosity of coach, Peter Carlstein, when Peter opened the doors of the W.A.C.A. Indoor School to the Club for the season. I would like to thank Peter for his off-field support and encouragement to me this year.

Special thanks to the team as a whole, and, in particular, to Brian Raven for his unfailing support and valuable comments regarding matters on and off the field.

To Peter "Pana" and the other captains, my gratitude for your words of wisdom at those exacting selection meetings.

I would like to make special mention of Ron Burgess, Graham Lees, Alan Bolton, and the Committee in general. On behalf of the players, I would like to extend to you their appreciation for your efforts in the non-glamorous but vitally important and time-consuming role of off-field organisation. Thanks to 'Bolts' on his days as 'A' Grade Team Manager, for support and enthusiasm second to none, as well as an assortment of colourful salty drinks! Comments:

Reflecting on the season with a view to 1985/86, it is obvious the team needs another strike bowler (or two). Many times this year we missed opportunities to bundle out sides, especially when Steve Neilsen was unavailable, because of our lack of strike bowlers to clean up the tail-enders after knocking over the early order batsmen.

Putting pressure on the opposing batsmen in the field is a facet of our game which needs attention. Perhaps a "fielding coach" should be appointed in the Club to strengthen this part of our game.

Not one batsman scored a hundred, although several of them had the opportunity, and in some cases, more than once. Concentration for longer periods and the ability to punish the loose ball are areas where our batsmen need to improve.

I am full of admiration for the Committee, which has worked long and hard at developing a first grade side, with "real" prospects of making the finals next year.

3RD GRADE REPORT

The 3rd Grade's performance during the year is summarised as follows:

Won	= 8 games

The side finished 5th on the premiership ladder, which was a good performance considering this team suffered from the loss of players to higher grades during the season, without being replaced by players from those grades. This was caused by the loss of players such as Steve Wright, Steve Mulhall, Paul Higgins, and in the latter part of the season, Steve Neilsen and Todd Breman. Also, the loss of experienced player - Peter Williams - after Christmas, appeared to unbalance the bowling balance of the side.

However, the side did have some memorable performances during the year, with quite a number of outstanding individual performances. Graham Stafford's 236 not out against North Perth, which is a club record individual score, highlights these performances. Nick Rule scored 103 in the same game, and shared a 237 run 1st wicket partnership with Graham. The side's total of 5 for 424 in this game is also a club record score. In the same game, North Perth were dismissed for 59, with Harold Christensen taking 5 for 16 off 11 unplayable overs. It is worth noting that North Perth finished third on the premiership table.

Wayne Hicks also batted very well in the early part of the year, making 101 N.O. against Scarborough and the 98 against Fremantle, before being promoted to the 2nds.
