VICE PRESIDENT'S FUNDING REPORT

In last years report I stated that "it is an extremely difficult task to not only attract but maintain sponsorship support if the Club is not seen to be a winning Club." I went on to say that the senior players of the club needed to address this particular aspect with respect to their approach to the game to ensure that the club continued to be successful both financially and in a playing sense.

Obviously as we look back on the 1987/88 cricket season the clubs players and in particular the 'A' Grade side performed on the field where it counted and as a consequence this has lead to financial achievement off the playing arena through the level of prize money which the club won as a consequence of the players efforts.

What was in retrospect a most difficult year in which to maintain the level of past sponsorship and fund-raising, due mainly to the decline in the financial markets not only here in Australia but on an international level, the performance by the players of the club proved to be not only pleasing with regard to the various awards that were won but also timely.

Reference to the financial statements for the club as at the 30th April, 1988 indicates that the club is in an extremely sound financial position.

The committee has taken the decision to retire part of the clubs borrowings thus leaving a small borrowing but in a position to continue its capital improvement programme, in particular the concept of constructing a new external balcony area to the northern end of the pavilion, if deemed appropriate.

To this end the club has a reserve provision in its accounts totalling \$5,300.00 to contribute to any proposed cost relating to future improvements.

Despite the changed financial environment after October, 1987 it was still pleasing to receive the continued support from Town and Country WA Building Society (Mr Ray Turner), Fitzgerald Realty (Mr Ray Fitzgerald, Phil and Mark Blizzard), The Ledge Group (Phil Botsis), West Coast Securities Pty Limited (Harold Christensen), Wembley Physiotherapy and Sports Injury Clinic (Greg Maskiell), NZI Securities Western Limited and Gemcor Limited.

I would also like to record our appreciation for the continued support of district cricket given by Mount Newman Mining, The Bond Group and indirectly all the other sponsors of the WACA.

I would also like to thank the non playing membership of the club for both their financial and player encouragement and support for the season. In particular John Roberts, a former player, for his generous financial gesture.

I also extend our appreciation to Phil Mulchay and staff at the Settlers House at York and the Shamrock Hotel at Northam for the



tremendous weekend that was spent there in September, prior to the commencement of the season when a club invitation 11 played the Northam Districts Cricket Club 11 as a pre-season fixture. All concerned had a memorable weekend.

Similarly, I would like to thank The Matilda Bay Brewing Company Limited for their support and assistance in putting together the wind up function at Plaistowes Bar and Grill. I am sure that all who attended enjoyed the evening.

In closing, I believe that the club is now financially well positioned to weather what I believe will be several difficult financial years ahead for district cricket in Western Australia.

I believe that the pennant clubs and in particular the W.A.C.A. will need to take a hard look at the financial foundations of district cricket as only the strong will survive in the future, with the result being a smaller number of clubs competing.

As such, as in the financial markets, I believe that our club should be pro-active and start to seek out opportunities to merge with other clubs of our own choice prior to being forced to, so as to ensure the continuing strength of cricket in the West Coast region.

Once again I thank all those involved with the club during the 1987/88 season for their financial commitment during a testing season.

The above results were a good improvement on the previous season with the winning of the Club Championship and the First Grade Premiership being the highlights.

However, our First Grade team played well below our capabilities in the Toyota Cup One Day Games because of lack of dedication and application which occurred occasionally during the season in our pennant games.


However, on match days its that "In Built" mental toughness and application to the job at hand that produces players good performances and team wins.

1st GRADE'S REPORT

Our 'A' Grade team won the Premiership and played a big part in the winning of the club championship.

Our first game of the season was against Scarborough at Floreat oval with the four WA"rebel cricketers" all returning to grade cricket in this game together with D.K. Lillee.

An estimated 1,500 people watched the game on an overcast and drizzling Saturday afternoon after the captain's had agreed to play in difficult conditions.

What an afternoon it was with D.K. Lillee charging in at our batsmen who all showed tremendous application and courage especially our openers Chris Smailes and Greg Fitzgerald.

Kim Hughes made a brilliant 100 runs and "belted" Lillee's short bowling and we ended up with 8 for 212 which was a winning score as we bowled Scarborough out for 95 with Terry Alderman, Brian Raven and Tom Hogan the wicket takers.

It was a great win in a very competitive game and displayed that "maybe" we had the team this year to win the Premiership

However, previous years traits followed us next game when we lost to Perth.

Once again we had first beaten a strong team and immediately lost to a so-called weak team.

We then beat Gosnells outright with Terry Alderman, Brian Raven and Giles Bush bowling excellently. Our next game (60 overs) was against Nedlands at the WACA another so called weak team.

We won somehow but played shockingly when we batted. Hayden Chrystal's 59 not out won the game with NO 11 batsman Brian Raven fighting for his life to not get dismissed.

At this stage of the season we had also played and lost all our Toyota rounds and it was obvious our bowling was going to be too good for most teams but our batsmen were not applying themselves and playing to their ability.

Peter joining us was a bonus because it registered to all players in the club that we were not happy with our batsmen and they all, including Peter, had to perform to keep their place in the 'A' Grade Team.

Next game (60 overs) we thrashed University with Todd Breman hitting a blistering 82 runs.

We bowled Midland-Guildford out for 153 runs with Terry Alderman (4 wickets) and Todd Breman (5 wickets) the wicket takers.



However on a magnificent batting wicket at Lilac Park with our full team we made only 102 runs.

After this game Kim resigned as Captain so that he could concentrate on his batting and force his way back into form and the state side. Terry Alderman took over with Tom Hogan as Vice Captain and Chris Smailes deputy Vice Captain.

We then played South Perth and lost by 4 runs chasing 294. Hayden Chrystal being the last batsman dismissed for a magnificent 131 runs.

The crunch had come and we had to start winning again and we did so in beating Mt Lawley in a nerve racking finish. Mt Lawley batted first and made 219 with Tom Hogan taking 7 for 62. After Chris Smailes (71) and Tom Hogan (58) had batted well we found ourselves 9 for 213. Brian Raven and Giles Bush took the score past Mt Lawley's with Giles Bush doing some sort of dance down the pitch after hitting the winning runs.

North Perth (60 over game) were dismissed for 116, and after being 5 for 89 a solid partnership between Tom Hogan and Greg Fitzgerald we declared at 5 for 117.

We then lost to Bayswater-Morley (186 v 250). Chris Smailes made an excellent 91 and Giles Bush took 6 for 73. Although we lost this game it was closer than the scores indicated and we were confident we had Bayswater-Morley's measure.

We then played Claremont - Cottesloe (60 over game) who batted first and made 147 and we managed only 111 runs. This was again a lack of application by our batsmen.

We now had to win our last four games to make the final four so we then proceeded to make things more challenging by loosing to Southern Districts by 22 runs. Martin Nice made 83 and Peter Gonnella 66 not out.

We now needed to win our last three games and possibly win one outright.

After Terry Alderman appealed to the players before the commencement of the game against Wanneroo we had them 8 for 32 after an hours play. Needless to say the Captain had taken 5 wickets in 42 degree heat. He was well supported by Todd Breman.

We dismissed Wanneroo for 114 runs and then made a quick 6 for 266 declared with the "NEW" Kim Hughes making 146 runs.

At 9 for 192 in Wanneroo's second innings we dropped a catch which "may" have cost us an outright win so badly needed.

We then played Melville and declared at 7 for 385 one hour before stumps, with Kim making 205 runs, batting with his old form.

We bowled Melville out for 188 and 112 with about 6 overs to spare. With the outright achieved we had to win our last game



and hope Claremont Cottesloe and North Perth lost theirs to make the four.

Well we won outright again against Fremantle, while Claremont - Cottesloe, North Perth and other teams in front of us all lost.

Unbelievably we had finished on top of the Premiership table and also won the Club Championship.

Against Fremantle Steve Wright scored 165 runs and Giles Bush took 11 wickets in an afternoon, both outstanding performances.

Against University in the semi-final we lost the toss and were sent into bat on a damp wicket, the game being rescheduled to a 60 over game.

At 6 for 121 Bayswater - Morley were in trouble however, Jamie Snadden and Dave Frame took their score to 196 before Frame "holed out" to Giles Bush with Tom Hogan taking an excellent catch.

Terry Alderman who had saved himself for the moment of truth then came back into the fray and took a wicket in his first over. It was now 8 for 220 surely we would win.

At 232 Jamie Snaddan decided to attack Giles Bush who was bowling his last over before the new ball was to be taken.

After hitting a four, then a six Jamie planned to hit another six but that great man Hogan was under the ball on the square leg boundary. A great man under pressure Tom took the catch, 9 for 232.

Bayswater - Morley's last two batsmen took the score to 241 and Todd Breman took the new ball.

Third ball of the over he bowled Steve Miloz, we had won, and the players went berserk what a great game, what a great win.

2nd GRADE CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The season started with a game against the previous years Premiers, Scarborough and with a new captain who was determined that the 2nd Grade would have a successful season.

Scarborough won the toss and in overcast conditions invited us to bat. Steady batting enabled us to reach 302 - 9 with major scores from A. Milne 83, I. Taylor 56 and M. Nice 53. As befitting a premiership team, Scarborough made a valiant effort but gave up the chase after loosing eight wickets, finishing on 261 - 8 (J. Gillam 5 wickets for 63).

The first game success made the team believe in itself, "team spirit" improved with every game to the extent that after round 9 and only one defeat, we were top of the table - a rare event, but justly deserved. Our ability to put a large total on the board (we scored 260 or more in the first innings on ten occasions during the season) whilst using up the full ninety-six overs, was a major reason for our success during the season.

One of the most memorable games was round 8 against Mt Lawley. With five "regulars" unavailable, and facing a target of 285 to win, the first hours play saw us at 5 for 39. Mt Lawley made the mistake of thinking that the game was over, but I was still convinced that we could win. Showing the character and determination of a top side, Steve Wright (59), Peter Farley (36), Tony Flynn (24), Brett Islip (20 N.O.), Nigel Clements (6 N.O.) - a last wicket stand of 16 - and a great innings by Glynn O'Brien of 104 (who also took 5 wickets for 64) ended in victory for Subiaco-Floreat with two overs to spare.

There were many outstanding individual performances throughout the season. With the bat Glynn O'Brien and Steve Wright scored back to back centuries, with Stuart Page and Duncan MacNish scoring one each. With the ball (we bowled ten sides out in their 1st innings) the main wicket takers were Ben Ward (23), Nigel Clements (29), Paul Hampton (19) and Duncan MacNish (16) - including the game v Nedlands of 110 overs for 7M, 4W and 6R.

The fielding was generally of a high standard (even Ian Taylor started to improve) with some splendid catching from Stuart Page W/K (21), Vince Rule (8), Ben Ward (7), Glynn O'Brien (6) and Peter Farley (6).



The good performance by the seconds was reflected in two major club awards. Martin Nice - "Most Improved Player" and Duncan MacNish - "Club Cricketer of the Year".

After finishing second in the league, a semi-final game against Bayswater-Morley ended in defeat after a closely contested game.






Participation in the WACA junior competitions continued as :




