

Kim Hughes had a good season with the bat topping the W.A.C.A. aggregate and he was unlucky to miss Shield selection.

And lastly to all players, members and supporters for their efforts during the season.

May we all work together to ensure the Club performs at the highest level in 1989/90 and thereafter.

VICE PRESIDENT'S FUNDING REPORT

The 1988/89 cricket season was financially the most challenging since my involvement with the Club's committee.

Reference to the financial statements will indicate that a loss for the year of \$ 7,587.00 was incurred prior to the transferring from provisions for future use, resulting in an overall deficit for the seasons operations of \$ 2,287.00.

The deficit is real in accounting terms but not in cash terms, with break-even being achieved if depreciation and amortisation provisions are excluded.

The major financial problem related to a shortfall in income in comparison to the previous season, the bulk of which being the absence of substantial prize money coming from on field performances.

It is obviously no secret that the Club had a fairly dismal year from a playing point of view after the unbelievable successes of the previous season.

The Club will now need to address its attitude towards fund-raising in the future as the prospects of obtaining financial support under the guise of sponsorship will continue to be most difficult.

Recent discussions with the W.A.C.A. executive indicates that they are becoming more aware of the plight of the pennant clubs in their pursuit of sponsorship and fund-raising and as such the W.A.C.A. has outlined a long term strategic sponsorship plan that should ultimately assist all pennant clubs.

This obviously will not occur overnight however, it is encouraging to see that the W.A.C.A. is finally addressing the financial problems of the clubs.

Once again I would like to thank Town and Country, Fitzgerald Starling Real Estate, Peter Briggs (Settlers House and Shamrock Hotel, Northam), Spargos Mining N.L., Gemcor Limited and Grants Patch Mining Limited for their financial support during the year.

We would also like to record our appreciation of Mt Newman Mining continuing their support for the pennant competition, Toyota for the Limited Overs competition, the Bond Group and the other financial supporters of the W.A.C.A.

Despite the difficult season the Club is capable of retiring all of its lir lities from current assets and thus leave itself in a position to enter the next era of cricket in the 1990's without being saddled with liabilities that are not covered.

After due consideration I have decided not to nominate for the committee for the 1989/90 season.



I believe that the time is now right for the Club to encourage new blood on the committee to meet the exciting challenges that undoubtedly lay ahead in the next couple of years in pennant cricket.

Undoubtedly there will be increasing pressure on the various clubs to consider amalgamation so as to encourage more cricket, better cricket and cricketers and more financial strength at pennant level.

- I have enjoyed my involvement with the Club and feel privileged to have seen the Club carry off the Club Championship, Minor 'A' Grade Premiers, W.A.C.A. 'A' Grade Premiership and other grade premierships during my involvement.
- I believe that we have achieved a great deal financially during the past few years and that the Club is well positioned to develop its cricketing strategies to take it into the immediate future.
- I thank all the past committee members, players and supporters together with the sponsors for the many years of enjoyment that I have had during my involvement and I wish the Club all the best both on and off the field in the future.

1st GRADE CAPTAIN'S REPORT

First game of the season was against Mt Lawley at Floreat Oval. After being sent in Mt Lawley batted well to score 6 for 310. In reply we made 9 for 269 with Peter Gonnella making 55, Gary Godfrey, Marty Saunders and Giles Bush fought hard towards the end of the day to prevent Mt Lawley from gaining a 1st innings win.

Against Wanneroo at Floreat we again struggled, bowling first and Wanneroo made 6 for 292, with Marty Saunders taking an encouraging 3 for 79 from 29 overs. Terry Alderman and Tom Hogan had State commitments. Gary Godfrey was injured and Giles Bush had floated off to Tasmania, with the Clubs best wishes, to pursue playing Shield Cricket for Tasmania. Kim Hughes captained the side well on the day, with a hard working, inexperienced bowling attack. On the following day we batted superbly to make 5 for 317. With Peter Gonnella 91, Kim Hughes 124 n.o. and 17 year old Glen Dehring in his debut making a superb 47 n.o. It was a magnificent win.

Todd Breman commenced cricket for the game against Perth to strengthen our bowling attack and bowled magnificently to take 6 for 46 from 31.4 overs. Hayden Chrystal bowled well taking 3 for 74 off 29 overs. Peter Gonnella's 1st over left everyone bewildered. We were very confident of scoring the necessary 275 runs to win however it poured with rain on Friday night and with the umpires unbelievably starting the game on time we had no chance, and at 7 for 60 after 1 hour 20 minutes of play Todd Breman hit a whirlwind 66 to enable us to be all out for 171. We batted again on a drying wicket and made 4 for 270 from 51 overs with Peter Gonnella making 100 n.o. Kim Hughes 86 and Hayden Chrystal 50 n.o.

The most disappointing thing from this game was to see one end of the pitch very much wetter and grassier than the other end.

Against South Perth we made 6 for 318 with Peter Gonnella making 80, Kim Hughes 80 and Glen Dehring 59 n.o. With Terry Alderman and Tom Hogan back from state duties and Giles Bush landing back from Tasmania we bowled South Perth out for 136 and then 88 to achieve the necessary outright. Terry Alderman bowled magnificently to take 11 wickets for the day.

Round 6 was against Fremantle at Floreat with Fremantle making 286 all-out. Giles Bush took 6 for 86 off 32.5 overs. The "Newcastle Kid" Jim Wilson, fast bowler extraordinare, bowled fast and well in his first game. On a slightly rain effected wicket we made a gutsy 8 for 247 with Greg Fitzgerald making 52 and Marty Saunders a hard hitting 69.

University made 291 all-out with Tom Hogan taking 5 for 98 and Marty Saunders 4 for 34. You wouldn't believe it at 4 for 212 from 74 overs rain stopped play. Stuart Page (54) and Greg Fitzgerald (51) batted very well for an opening partnership of 88.

We batted brilliantly to score 6 for 374 against Willetton at Burrendah with Kim Hughes (133), Peter Gonnella (109) and Stuart Page (40). However we could only manage a winning draw with Willetton making 8 for 324



We batted first against Melville making 233 with Kim Hughes making 84, Giles Bush renowned for his wicket taking achievements against Melville over many years took 7 for 62 from 36 overs to bowl Melville out for 200.

Tom Hogan also bowled superbly for 2 for 66 from 39.3 overs.

Midland Guildford made 301 in their 1st innings at Floreat oval in round 10, after being 7 for 207. Todd Breman took 6 for 81. Dropped catches proved very costly. On an over watered pitch we had no chance and were dismissed for 116 in our first innings. In our 2nd innings we made 2 for 157 Kim Hughes making 93 and Gary Godfrey a well compiled 37 n.o.

Nothing else other than bad batting saw us bowled out for 150 against North Perth at Charles Veryard Oval. They certainly made us suffer and declared at 5 for 303 and then took 5 wickets to have us 5 for 49 in our 2nd innings. Unfortunately our inept batting continued against Bayswater/Morley at Floreat Oval with us being all out for 146. Bayswater/Morley batted very well and scored 325 all out, with Tom Hogan bowling very well and competitively to take 6 for 96 from 42.4 overs.

We bounced back against Nedlands to have them all out for 195 with all bowlers bowling well. At stumps we were 1 for 36, rain prevented play the second week of this game.

Needing two out-rights and a lot of other lucky results to make the four Scarborough were bowled out for 174. Paul Hampton got the first 3 wickets and at 8 for 110 there seemed to be an outright possibility, however an eighth wicket partnership of 60 runs between Peter Henderson and David Clear ended our extremely hopeful dreams for 88/89. We were dismissed for 146 with only Kim Hughes (46) and Hayden Chrystal (43) batting well against some very good bowling from Scarborough English import David Capel who took 7 for 76.

The last game was against Gosnells and provided an opportunity for many of our young players. We had bowled well to have Gosnells 6 for 220 however a big hitting 114 n.o. by B. French saw Gosnells score 8 for 341. All bowlers tried very hard with Glyn O'Brien taking a rewarding 5 for 83. Unfortunately on a magnificent batting pitch we were all out for 213. Andrew Milne (65) and Tom Hogan (75) batted very well.

The game finished early and so had the season.

In summary we had an unsettled season in some areas which need reviewing for the forthcoming years. We played some outstanding cricket on occasions however, overall our batting application and fielding, especially dropped catches, cost us playing in the finals. Also, unfortunately during some games it rained when we seemed likely to win.

Congratulations to Terry Alderman on playing Test Cricket again and also to Kim Hughes, Tom Hogan and Peter Gonnella for playing State Cricket, and to Martin Nice and Glen Dehring for making the U/19's State Team and Geoff Barr the U/17's State Team.

Never has that well known saying of "cricket is a funny old game" been so true than this season. Last year we were never out of the top two, this year (with on paper a more experienced side) hardly ever out of the bottom two.

Our form didn't help push the 'A' Grade as it had done last season, but with thirty players used in the 2nd grade (eight more than last year) which is too many players for any team.

We never recovered from a one run defeat in the first game - the importance of a winning start is so vital. Out first victory did not arrive until round six, an excellent team performance to beat Fremantle (who had won their previous sixteen games) by 25 runs. Stuart Page (79) and Nick Rule (89) put on 160 for the first wicket, Brett Islip bowled 35 overs for 5-97 and there was a great piece of fielding by Peter Farley, who ran out P. Sumich (59) with a throw from fully 50 metres to capture the 9th wicket.

The game also saw a fine display behind the stumps by Doug Dallimore. Six catches that game, a total of 21 catches and 1 stumping from five 2nd grade games as well as a batting average of 28.5, shows that Doug has the ability to make the 'A' Grade one day.

The bowling lacked penetration at times - we only managed to bowl out five sides all season. Glyn O'Brien (19), Paul Hampton (15), Peter Farley (15) and Corry Gill (13) were the main wicket takers, in all 19 players took wickets.

In the batting, only Stuart Page (393 runs at Ave 34.3) maintained any consistency, although Ian Taylor (356 runs at 25.2), Vince Rule (two 100's, 105 and 113,), Steve Wright (one 100) 140 and Andrew Milne (one 100) 135 showed occasional good form.

4th GRADE CAPTAIN'S REPORT

A wise old cricketer once said "there is no shortage of humour in fourth grade!" The 1988/89 Subiaco-Floreat fourth grade team proved this old wise tale to be inordinately correct. Initially with an emphasis on youth combined with a couple of veterans plus some interesting player gains the 4th grade started the season slowly. As the season progressed performances both individually and as a team began to improve. The end result was a 7 win, 5 loss, 1 loosing draw, and 1 draw record. Not sufficient to finish in the four, however, certainly strong enough to beat several of the top teams in the second half of the year.

Twenty six players passed through the side during the course of the season and this always creates difficulties with stability. By mid-season a nucleus of players including, Duff, Cato, Dos, Simo, Grogan, Deano and Ossie combined with the skipper to provide some team morale and interest in striving for victory each week. As the season progressed Ossie strung together some fine bowling performances, none better than his huge effort against Scarborough where Ossie bowled 14 overs taking 2-56 plus 1 catch and 2 run outs. This followed a miraculous run out earlier in the season against Midland where Ossie threw the stumps down from the boundary, changing the course of the game. Ossie finished with 17 wickets at 19.11. Dean Rettalack provided steady support with the ball as well as chiming in some useful performances with the bat. Dean typified the spirit within the team and was happy to contribute in whatever capacity asked of him. Duff, Dos and latecomer to the team Simo all contributed at various stages.

Duff and Dos need to develop a little more consistency and both should subsequently move up the grades. Outside of the skipper, Duff was the only other member of the team to qualify for the batting averages scoring 217 runs. Dos the mean machine, terrified the opposition with the mean Italian glare, also weighed in with some useful knocks. Who will forget his blistering 31 against Scarborough (including one ball into the lake) and his 50 not out against Fremantle (also one lost ball over the fence). In summary it was a good year where I'm sure most learnt something about the game and this should be put to good use next season. It is not true (Ben) that we lost the first game outright to Mount Lawley and that green helmets have been re-introduced for potential Australian players. COLTS REPORT - 1988/89


