## COACH'S REPORT 1990/91

The Club won the Club Championship, had four teams in the finals and won two premierships, a very successful year? Successful - yes, very successful - no.

The year was successful because we developed on programmes of skill development and club planning from the previous year, successful because we lost experienced players from the higher grades and covered these losses through recruiting and internal player development, successful because there is some obvious, young, developing talent and successful because our two premiership sides proved most significantly what happens when talent and attitude work as one.

Why then was the season not VERY successful. The answer is obvious in the extreme, the 1st XI having finished on top of the table capitulated humiliatingly in their final appearance. This humiliation was further heightened by the fact that our opposition was certainly no more talented but were clearly superior in their application and attitude to the task at hand.

Can we do better in season 1991/92? The answer once again is simple, we have to, for if we don't we will regress as a club.

How can this be achieved? With a few obvious exceptions our hunger for work and our self initiative at training and thus in game situations still is cause for concern. I propose to revamp training procedures to far utilise experience, expertise and leadership and to generate greater self initiative and thus improve practice and on field productivity.

Our batting as a club was once again ordinary. To have players winning batting awards with averages in the thirties highlights this point. Our batting still lacks discipline and consistency, the points made above relative to practice efficiency are highlighted once again.

Our bowling performances throughout the year were very sound. But, I shudder to think how much more impressive our bowling would have been had our fielding and particularly our catching been of a satisfactory standard. There is much work to do in this area and revised practice procedures will reflect our need to significantly lift our standard.

As a club we are one of the Leagues' powers, we must develop so that we become the power, so that we dominate and intimidate.

## 'A' GRADE CAPTAIN'S REPORT 1990/91

The 1990/91 Season for the 'A' Grade, was virtually split into two separate halves, concluding in a disappointing performance in the semi finals.

I have spoken about the inconsistencies of our batting previously and the first half of the season was no exception. We managed to lose every consecutive game, during the first seven fixtures. The batting once again proved to be our "achilles heel" with a general lack of commitment from the majority of the top order batsmen. The statistics show that we averaged 189 runs per innings for those seven fixtures.

Those mediocre scores, are never going to allow us to win games on a consistent basis. The side has in the past, become reliant on our bowling and fielding to carry us over the line. As I have expressed previously, good sides have the ability to perform at a desired level in all aspects of the game. As a result, we managed three wins from seven games.

The second half of the season was in direct contrast to the first. We averaged 289 runs per innings, a total we should adopt as a minimum target. As a result, we won five out of our last six fixtures, proving what is necessary to be a consistently competitive side. We have to instil a mentality that allows us to not only win, but to win well.

The bowling for the majority of the season, was of a high standard. There is however, a tendency at times to drop our heads when the game is not going our way. This is one area we need to work on but I felt there was a significant improvement from the previous season.

Selection of the team was extremely difficult all season, indicating a good depth of talent in the club and resulting in a club championship. My admiration and thanks to the players who accepted the decisions of the selectors and got on with task of playing cricket.

I have specifically not mentioned players because I feel our future success depends on team performances and not that of the individual. There were however some very fine performances during the season with both bat and ball.

I hope players take the opportunity over the winter months, to analyse their past seasons performances and create new goals for the forthcoming season.

My sincere thanks to the players, Don and the Committee for their support during the year.

Congratulations to the Seconds and Fourths on their great premierships victories.

## 2nd GRADE CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The winning of the Premiership finished off a great year for the Second Grade team. We were fortunate enough to have a very talented side, but it was the team spirit and desire to win that were the major factors behind our success.

We had a five wicket victory over South Perth in the Grand Final but it wasn't all smooth sailing. South Perth won the toss and batted and were cruising at 2/85 just after lunch before Gavin Swan struck with a spirited spell of fast bowling — Swan picked up three key wickets, and along with Andrew Kiely, destroyed the South Perth batting line up. Swan's 4/61 and Andrew Kiely's 5/43 of 24.5 consecutive overs restricted South Perth to 150. The run chase began poorly and at stumps of the first day we were struggling at 4/51. However, there was still a lot of batting to come and a determined 90 run partnership between John Fitzgerald (49) and Vince Rule (63 not out) assured victory for Subiaco-Floreat. Thanks go to the 4th grade side and other Club Members for their support over the weekend.

The Semi-final against Melville the previous week was a thriller. Melville, who had won the two previous second grade titles, had managed to load a near A grade side into their team. We batted first under difficult conditions, and were in trouble early at 3/21. However, we fought back well, with proven finals performer Stuart Page (59), Steve Mulhall (37), Anthony Flynn (71) and Steve Nielson (23) getting the score up to 234. Flynn, a late inclusion in the side, played a brilliant attacking innings against a quality attack, to set up victory for the side. The strong Melville batting line up really gave us a run for our money the next day and fell only six runs short of our total. Steve Nielson bowled superbly to take 4/64 and the team fielded well under pressure.

Our batting was a lot more consistent this year, with our lowest score being 151 against North Perth, a game we ended up winning. Dave Harris with 365 runs at 36.50 deservedly won the averages, and made many of these runs in tight situations when we were chasing victory. Harris was well supported by Steve George (332 runs @ 30.18), Murray Nixon (250 runs @ 25.00), Marty Nice (239 runs @ 26.56) and Anthony Flynn (231 runs @ 23.10). Good individual efforts included Glen Dehring 91 versus Gosnells, Steve George 92 versus University and 82 versus South Perth, Dave Harris 78 against Midland and Steve Mulhall 75 against Midland.

Andrew Kiely with 33 wickets @ 20.24 was our most consistent bowler throughout the season, and he took three five wicket hauls, being 6/98 against Claremont-Nedlands, 6/59 against South Perth and 5/43 in the Grand Final. Akhtar, in his brief stay in seconds, took 22 wickets at 10.64, including 6/20 against Scarborough and a match winning 7/30 against North Perth. As most of the bowlers spent time in the first grade side, the rest of the wickets were fairly evenly spread, with solid contributions from Swan, Neilsen, Murphy, Fitzgerald, Godfrey and Flynn.



The wicket-keeping duties were shared between Steve George, Jason Norrish and Stuart Page, with Page keeping very well in both finals. Murray Nixon with his unconventional catching technique was the leading catch taker with 11 catches, whilst Martin Nice and Dave Harris set the standard for ground fielding.

The most pleasing aspect about our victory this year was that the 12 players who played in the finals all contributed strongly to the teams on field success throughout the year, and all helped build up a great team spirit. There obviously is a correlation between the number of victories and the number of cans consumed by the team together after the games.

I would like to thank the players for their support during the year, and the Committee for their efforts. I would also like to thank our Coach, Don Weir, who made my job a lot easier and who has made a big contribution to the club over the last two years.

I mentioned in my Captain's report last year that the reason we finished fourth that year instead of first, was because only about three quarters of the team had a strong desire to win and were prepared to put in the effort required. Fortunately, this year we had about 15 players that really wanted to be part of a winning grand final side. There are similarities in this respect between the 2nd grad side of 1989/90 and the A grade side of this year. I hope that the Second Grade Premiership players can bridge that gap for the A grade next season.

### 3rd GRADE CAPTAIN'S REPORT

In searching for a distinguishing feature of the Third Grade for Season 1990/91 I would say that we were the "The Great Improvers". In direct contrast to the previous season where the Third Grade team finished without winning a game after Christmas and ending up well in the lower half of the table, this season we won every game after Christmas and finished strongly to take third position at the end of the final round. In fact I am sure I would express the sentiments of the entire team when I say that the only thing which stopped us from winning a premiership this season was rain on the second day of the semi final against Claremont-Nedlands (the eventual premiership winners) which forced the draw and thus our omission from the final series.

This season started under the helmsmanship of Nick "Golden Goblet" Rule who showed us exactly why he earned his nickname with two superb centuries in the first two games of the season. Indeed his first up 174 against Willetton was one of the finest grade innings which I have personally witnessed (perhaps even rivalling Graham Stafford's double century at North Perth a few years back).

The good form of the captain resulted in his rise to second grade in round 3 and 'yours truly' was asked to take over the reins. Having won our first two games we promptly lost the next three under the new captaincy. I might say in my defence that this largely due to the loss of a prolific scoring opening batsman than to poor captaincy. It was also due to the lack of experience in the team with the average age (bar one or two of us) still not being old enough to order a drink at the Floreat.

At the end of round six with a win loss record of 2:3 and one washout we were facing a bye in the next round and lamenting in twelfth place on the table. I explained to the players there and then that there was plenty of talent in the team and we could make the finals if we really wanted to and showed a bit more application. After the Christmas break the players responded to that challenge by winning the next six consecutive games to take us into the semi-finals.

Our success was largely due to a much improved batting performance, some tight, steady bowling and a very sharp fielding team once some alterations to the slips field had been made (i.e. the captain being moved from second slip to mid on).

On the batting front we had excellent contributions from our international import Oliver Smith who scored a memorable 112 in century-plus heat at Gosnells and finished the season with an average of 46.63 which would under normal circumstances have won him the batting average. In the same game against Gosnells he showed us how handy he was with the ball taking 6 for 35 with his gentle off-spinners. A big improver with the bat this season was Karl Plaisted who after overcoming his disappointment at being dropped from second grade became our prime batsman in the second half of the season with 314 runs at an average of 44.86 and a highest score of 89. His 61 in the semi final made under great pressure was a true indicator of the fact that he is once again ready for the challenge of higher grades.

There were also good contributions from younger players, Sean Healey, David Darragh and Jason Norrish who should all improve further next year with the benefit of this year's experience.



Finally on the batting front it would be remiss of me not to mention a superb batting performance by Glyn O'Brien against Midland-Guildford scoring 104 runs having gone into bat with the team reeling at 5 for 64. He shared a 100 run 7th wicket partnership with Sean Healey who gave him excellent support scoring 41 himself.

In the bowling department we relied heavily on a tight and steady attack rather than devastating pace. Glyn O'Brien won the bowling averages with 17 wickets at 15.71. Nigel ("Beef-dog") Clements can consider himself unlucky however, having taken 17 wickets at 17.18 in Third Grade as well as taking 21 wickets in Fourth Grade at some ridiculously low average. The bowlers can best be described as "enthusiastic" which is exemplified by the disappointment expressed when they were asked to take a rest by the captain. The big improvers deserving of a mention in the bowling department are young players, Tim Beattie and Craig McQueen. Whilst neither player took a bagful of wickets they both showed tremendous potential and bowled exceptionally tightly at times in pressure situations for players of their experience.

In the fielding department we were fortunate to have a capable gloveman in Sean Healey who improved with every game until suffering a spate of hamstring injuries. He was ably supported by replacement keepers, Mike Simpson and George Tolev.

I would also like to mention the strong contributions provided by Steve Mulhall, Anthony Flynn, Gary Godfrey and Joel Murphy who all played higher grades during the season. In particular Gary Godfrey showed a great deal of character in overcoming disappointment at being dropped after an ankle injury and performed exceptionally in the finals taking 4/29 off 19 overs.

All in all it was a most enjoyable season and I gained a great deal of satisfaction out of seeing the younger players improve so much, especially in the second half of the season. I hope to see you all back there in 1991/92 when we surely will go one step further and take the premiership.

The reasons for our success were due to the players desire to win each and every game, their willingness to play disciplined cricket and their continued improvement throughout the season of their cricket skills.

A closer look at the teams performances shows that four batsmen scored 300 or more runs for the season and that four bowlers took 20 or more wickets. By having such a large core of players making significant contributions over the season the team was always able to put itself into a winning position and then go on and clinch the win. Only once did we falter losing to Scarborough in the third round.

Individually, our batting was lead by Peter Farley, who had a tremendous season, scoring 468 runs at an average of 36.0 including a superb innings of 111 against Wanneroo. Rick Dunstan 327 runs at 36.33 (including 4 50's) and Bernie Letessier 376 runs at 31.33 (including 2 50's) also had fine seasons with the bat. Englishman Mark Newton scored 266 runs in 5 games at 44.33 including a rapidfire 94 not out vs. North Perth. George Tolev scored 265 runs in 3 games including 98 against Perth. Alistair Barnes batted well when he returned to the fourths, batting at number 3 he showed good composure and technique to bat through the innings in successive matches to finish with undefeated 50's, and finished the season with 195 runs at 32.50.

Richard Catlin's return to the fourths saw him find form and in 9 games his left arm medium fast bowling saw him take 30 wickets at an average of 10.67. Skipper Greg Catlin plugged away all season to finish with 38 wickets at 12.47 and surprised the University team by taking 8 for 40 against them. Nigel Clements found form in the fourth grade, in three games he took 21 wickets at 7.24 including a remarkable 7 for 25 in the second innings against Gosnells. Peter Farley was miserly with his off spinners taking 16 wickets at 14.69 and big Craig McQueen bowled fast in his five matches taking 14 wickets at 12.64 including a match winning 6 for 30 against Willetton.

Wicketkeeper Michael Simpon had a fine season taking 32 catches and scoring 238 runs at 29.75 including 93 against Fremantle. Reserve keeper, Andrew Worland played well taking 14 catches and showed promise with the bat.

Allrounder Scott Powell had a marvellous introduction to senior cricket, after a slow start he improved dramatically finishing the season with 21 wicket at 17.19 and scoring 306 runs at 23.54.





The highlight of the season was, of course, the finals series. In the semi final against Mt Lawley the fourths won the toss and batted. Openers Alistair Barnes and Bernie LeTessier started with an opening partnership of 44 before Barnes was out for 22. LeTessier, 75, and Peter Farley, 43, continued to score runs in the middle session, before a rapid 36 off 29 balls including 3 sixes by Scott Powell and a solid 34 not out by Rick Dunstan saw the score reach 5 for 236 off 92 overs. The next day play was delayed by three hours due to rain, giving Mt Lawley little hope of victory. On a rain affected pitch they succumbed to be all out for 103. Greg Catlin took 6 for 58 and Scott Powell 2 for 48. The Grand Final opponents were second placed Bayswater-Morley who the fourths had not played during the regular season. The skipper's form with the toss continued and again the fourths elected to bat first on a hard Stevens Reserve pitch. The good start hoped for did not eventuate, after being none for 24 the team slumped to 4 for 71 before Peter Farley once again came to the rescue, this time with the help of under 17 player James Tranter. They put on 73 runs for the fifth wicket, before Farley was run out for 71. Another wicket fell soon after, which brought Scott Powell to the crease. Tranter continued to score runs before being bowled for 47, which was fine innings in only his third senior game of the season. Powell meanwhile was hammering the attack and hit a huge six out of the ground before getting out for 52. Andrew Worland hit out intelligently at the end scoring 38 not out and the fourths finished with 9 for 265 off their 92 overs.

The next day saw the fourths get off to a good start when Craig McQueen and Michael Simpson combined to remove one of the opening bats caught behind down the legside of the fourth over. However some wayward bowling and a lightning quick outfield saw Bayswater-Morley score quickly, before Richard Catlin fell both the other opening bat and his wickets with one well directed bouncer. Greg Catlin came into the attack and quickly took two wickets leaving Bayswater in trouble at lunch at 4 for 72.

Peter Farley started off the bowling in the middle session and began to tie the batsman down, with Scott Powell bowling well from the other end, runs were becoming hard to score. The Bayswater batsmen were becoming frustrated as easy runs were denied them and before long Farley enticed two rash shots which both resulted in wickets, one a brilliant overhead catch by Richard Catlin on the boundary. Next it was Powell's turn to strike, bowling Bayswater's top scorer for 73. By the tea interval Bayswater were 110 runs behind, with 30 overs still to be bowled but only 3 wickets in hand. The lower order batsman battled gamely but with Farley and Richard Catlin bowling tightly backed up by positive fielding they could never maintain the required run rate. The pressure became too much for the batsmen and Bayswater lost its last three wickets as the batsmen tried to hit out. Rick Dunstan took all three of the catches.

Peter Farley finished with 3 for 48 off 24 overs, Richard Catlin 3 for 55 off 27 overs and Greg Catlin 2 for 27 off 14 overs. It was a magnificent victory and a fine way to finish off a successful and enjoyable season.

Finally, as captain, I would like to thank all the players for their efforts and support during the season. It was a great season and I look forward to repeating it next season.

## JUNIOR COUNCIL REPORT — 1990/91

Junior cricket in the 1990/91 season continued under the same arrangements as made for the 1989/90 season. Kanga cricket for U11 and younger was conducted under direct control of Junior Council, while local teams from U12 to U17 were again entered in the Scarborough District competitions.

The Kanga Cricket program was again ably lead by David Forbes, with the assistance of a dedicated group of helpers. The demand for this introduction to cricket was maintained at the level previously attained, and numbers were sufficient to support organisation into two parallel groups based on general ability and level of skills development.

The more advanced skills group participated in modified rules games played on hard wicket surfaces, but within the general guidelines and concepts of the Kanga program.

The visit to the WACA for the demonstration games on Saturday 3rd November 1990 was again a highlight of the Kanga season. The end of season wind-up day at Floreat Oval on March 10th was also well attended by players and their parents, and provided a fitting end to the season. Our thanks to David, his support group, and the other parents who continued to provide the children with necessary guidance and encouragement.

Local level teams playing in the Scarborough District competition again performed creditably in several grades. The U17s team and one of the U14s completed their qualifying rounds in second position, only to fall in the respective semi-finals. The team playing under the Wembley Downs banner in the U15s bettered these performances, sharing their championship after the final could not be completed. Thanks are due to all those who assisted with teams management, administration, and other tasks necessary to sustain this effort. Thanks also to parents and players.

The formal WACA Junior Competitions for U13, U15, and U17 age groups produced mixed results.

Richard Parkin and his group of helpers produced a very good team for the Inverarity Shield (U13) competition. The first four games ended in victory, but the team went down to a very competitive Midland-Guildford combination in the fifth, and narrowly missed a place in the finals round.

Our thanks to Richard Parkin and his team for their efforts. Richard Catlin is specially thanked for this contribution at training sessions.

Phil Botsis managed the U15s, and provided encouragement for the players in a young team to persevere with their efforts during a difficult season. With most players in their first year at U15s, the experience gained should prove beneficial in quest of a better result during the 1991/92 season. Thanks to Phil and the boys for their contributions.

The under 17s had a difficult season, but did record some good wins. James Tranter excelled with the bat, scoring 371 runs at an average of 41.22. His 109 n.o. vs Mount Lawley was a great fighting innings. He was well supported by Bradley Barnes with 225 runs at an average of 25.00.

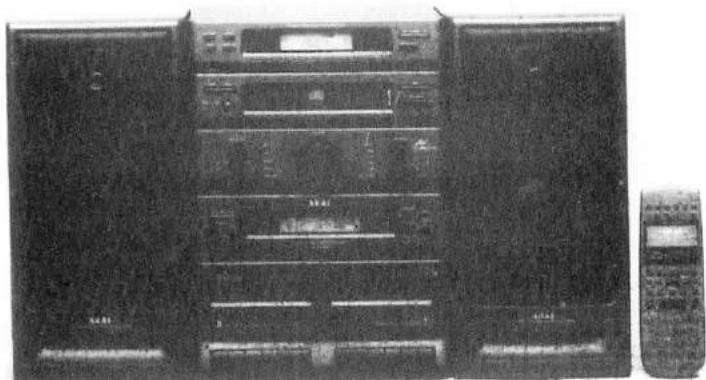
