Vale Ray Young, Inaugural Club President

The Club's first President, Ray Young, died of cancer in December 2000, aged 62. Ray was an enthusiastic cricket supporter and a major benefactor of the club, contributing monthly to our bank account since 1977/78 when he presided over the merged club. In those days, he was an MP and then minister for Health and Community Welfare in the Sir Charles Court government. He retired from politics in 1983 and devoted much of the rest of his life to working for disabled people as the chairman of the Disability Services Commission as well as holding appointments as director of a number of public companies and charities. Ray will be missed for his energy, his willingness to help people and his resourcefulness. He was a regular attender at club functions – our condolences to his widow Sheenagh and children.

The 2000/01 pennant season was a very successful one for the Subiaco-Floreat Cricket club. The A Grade side were minor premiers and the club won the WACA Club Championship. All 4 grades finished in top positions, the 3rds being 2nd and all others finishing 1st. We were A Grade premiers, 4th Grade premiers and Colts premiers (3rd time in 4 years) with 2nds & 3rds semi-finalists. A top result and great team effort. I consider the club will be a force in the WACA competition for some years to come, as most present players will continue with the club.

Congratulations to the Captains, Gavin Swan A Grade, Tim Silinger 2nds, who by the way was runner up in the voting for the J P Robbins Medal for the 2nds best & fairest, Clinton Palmer 3rds, and Bernie Le Tessier 4ths. Their vice-captains and team-mates capably assisted them.

We saw the return of Murray Goodwin after a very successful term with Zimbabwe. This was a bonus for the club. His innings of 120no against Scarborough in the semi-final was a gem and no doubt paved the way to our final appearance. He was ably assisted with the bowling of our State Rep Gavin Swan who produced a match winning "7-for". We also saw the emergence of a talented batting & bowling line up.

Congratulations to our various state representatives – Murray Goodwin smashed an Australian record one-day score of 167 from 138 balls whilst Gavin Swan collected 3 for 31 versus the West Indies in a state game as well as performing well in a number of Pura Milk games. The State's Under 19 side was captained by Brett Jones and included Kim Wulff, whilst the Under 17 state team included Ian Hyland and Chad Jones. Ian was selected for the Australian Under 17 team as a result of his performance at the interstate carnival. Well done to all of you.

This year we gained the service of a highly profiled and qualified coach in Noel Knight who has added a 3rd A Grade WACA premiership to his belt in a period of 8 years and received the 2000/01 WACA Coach of the Year award. We have really appreciated his time and involvement with the club. Ian Herbert our previous coach, who due to family commitments did not reapply for the position, returned to assist with the batting coaching. Jim Hubble, a former Test and State player, assisted with the bowling side. Graham Gaunt got the Colts another premiership and Craig Harms did the motivation side. Thanks for your efforts and I guess your reward was the Club's achievement.

COACH'S REPORT

In terms of achievements, this season was an outstanding one. With a Club Championship, WACA Sunsmart Minor Premiers in Grades One, Two and Four and second in Grade Three, Premierships in Grades One and Four, Emu Draft Colts One Day Premiers and a Bankwest One Day Semi Final, you could not ask for any more. Every other WACA Club would be envious of that record.

July 30 was the start of our pre-season campaign and it seems so long ago that this fantastic journey started. The pre-season program consisted of fitness work in the form of boxing and small weight routines conducted one night per week at the SFCC clubrooms and in-door net sessions at the WACA one night per week and net practice/fitness sessions on Sunday mornings. Those players who attended on a regular basis built a strong foundation in readiness for the commencement of the season.

Sixty four players represented the Club this season with First Grade (15 players), Second Grade (21 players), Third Grade (26 players) and Fourth Grade (29 players), as you would expect both lower Grades had the highest player representation. Nine U/17 players represented the Club at senior level and all acquitted themselves well at various stages of the season. We look forward to those players commencing full time duties in the seniors next season.

During the qualifying fixtures, there were eleven hundreds scored and forty nine times a player exceeded fifty runs in an innings and nineteen times a bowler took five wickets or more in an innings. There were some very good individual efforts during the qualifying fixtures, but I would like to highlight those performances in the respective Grades final's campaign. Hundreds were scored by Murray Goodwin – 1st Grade Semi Final, Daniel Barnes – 2nd Grade Elimination Final, Steve George – 3rd Grade Elimination Final and Adam Bolton – 4th Grade Elimination Final. Five wicket hauls were taken by Michael Clark – 1st Grade elimination Final and Gavin Swan – 1st Grade Semi Final and Grand Final.

In assessing the season, the following comments are made:

Batting

While there are a number of batsmen in each of the grades who can look back on the season with some degree of satisfaction, there were very few who consistently dominated the bowling attacks in their respective grade. On far too many occasions, batsmen got solid starts and failed to go on to bigger scores. The ratio of fifties to hundreds scored will support this. Batsmen through all grades must be prepared to develop their batting skills outside the normal Tuesday/Thursday practice nights. They must also realise that developing a mental toughness will enable them to be more patient and bat for longer periods, which is the key to successful batting.

Bowling

All grades were well equipped with bowlers, and there were very few occasions that any SFCC side failed to bowl an opposition side out. This is vital given the current format of "open" cricket adopted by the WACA. Many victories through the season were set up with strong bowling performances through the grades. The 1st Grade side in particular had a well balanced attack, with Gavin Swan, Sam Howman, Michael Clark, Robbie Campbell, Scott Moody and Phil Henryon until injury forced him out of cricket midway through the season, all making significant contributions.

Fielding

This facet of the game was of a generally high standard across the grades. It is an area, which has a significant impact on the result of any cricket game and was targeted for special emphasis at training this season. I believe part of the success of the 1st grade side can be attributed to the high standard of catching and ground fielding displayed during the season.

Training

In the main, training was well attended. I believe there is still room for some improvement, especially in the area of training start times. Where possible, players should be endeavouring to make arrangements with their employer to enable them to commence training by 5.15pm. This would ensure the Net Practice Captain's job of managing all aspects of training would be a less arduous one.

Fitness

Player's must realise there is a correlation between fitness and the ability to concentrate for long periods which impacts on all facets of this great game of cricket. All players should be prepared to maintain their fitness once pre-season is finished by having a set fitness regime which is outside normal training sessions.

Practice Wickets

We are all aware that the practice wickets are sub standard and SFCC administrators are endeavouring to address this issue with the Town of Cambridge. It is easy to use this problem area as an excuse for poor batting performances, however, it can also serve to make batsmen more determined to succeed under difficult circumstances. It was always pleasing to see those players who took up the challenge and batted "tough" on practice nights and then translated that tough approach into good performances on match days.

Special thanks go to:

- Grade Captains The job of Grade Captain is not an easy one and to Gavin, Tim, Clinton and Bernie, many thanks for jobs well done in this sometimes difficult task. Your ability to engender both team and Club spirit was an important factor in our Club Championship win. To take your respective side into the finals was I'm sure very rewarding for you all. Special thanks also to the Vice Captains of all the grades for your valuable support you provided the Captains. Thanks Lads.
- Chris Beattie Chris' contribution as Net Practice Captain was an invaluable one. His professional approach to his duties and good rapport he had with the players made him an important cog in our performance this season. Thanks Chris.
- Kerry Darragh Kerry's role of Club Selector was an important one in the team selection process. His knowledge of the players and time spent watching all the grades on Saturday afternoons ensured every player was given due consideration at the selection table. His communication and organisation skills were outstanding. Thanks Kerry.
- Alan Bolton Alan was a great "sounding board" for me this season. He listened to my ideas and was prepared to provide positive feedback where appropriate. His knowledge of grade cricket and what it takes to be successful is second to none. His ability to be "up front" when talking to prospective recruits to the Club was also a vital and appreciated attribute. Alan is Subiaco Floreat through and through and it was very pleasing for me to see him so thrilled with the Club's successes this season. Thanks Bolts.
- Graham Gaunt Graham again took on the role of Coach of the Colts and again he was successful guiding them to another Emu Draft One Day Premiership, the Club's third in four years. Thanks also Graham for your support on training nights.
- Craig Harmes Craig resumed with the Club towards the end of the season and conducted a mental skills program for the First and Second Grade players. It is an area of the game where it is sometimes difficult to identify the tangible benefits attained from such programs. From my perspective, I believe players should "open up their minds" and take every opportunity to further develop their mental skills that will not only assist in further enhancing their sporting prowess but also their personal lives. - Ian Herbert Herbie's policy of promoting talented juniors up through the grades in the previous four years at the Club finally bore fruit this season. He is highly respected by all at the Club and it was great to have him working with some of the batsmen through the season. Thanks lan for your contribution.
- Jim Hubble Jim worked with Michael Clark in particular early in the season and had a decided impact on his development as a competent left arm swing bowler. Jim's credentials made him an ideal mentor for Michael and it is hoped he can again further contribute to his and other bowler's development next season. Thanks Jim.

It doesn't get any better than what we achieved this season, and I'm sure it will be difficult emulating those successes next season. Everyone involved in the Club can feel very proud of their achievements as it has been a real team effort with every person making a contribution. However, it is vitally important that we don't rest on our laurels but strive to improve our respective performances. If this can be achieved then I'm confident further SFCC successes will follow and SFCC's standing as "Top Dog" in WACA cricket will be maintained.

1st GRADE CAPTAIN'S REPORT

After many years, thirteen in fact, the first grade team has secured the first grade premiership. It was a tremendous day for the group of twelve players who achieved this and it was a great day for the club. To finish minor premiers and to win the Grand Final so convincingly, shows now that we have developed into a unit, which is mentally tough enough to be successful at this level. In last year's report I said,

"The 1st grade team this year performed very well with a good balance of youth and experience. The team's success I believe can be attributed to a much more disciplined approach to our bowling and batting and when this is compiled with quality fielding and catching, not many teams were good enough to beat us."

This comment can be paralleled to this season, except that now we have learnt from previous disappointments in finals and consequently more hunger was evident amongst the group.

Our team spirit and camaraderie, coupled with our discipline to play to the team plan, ensured our success this season. There was not one weak link amongst the group and there was a terrific balance of youth and experience. In previous years our batting has struggled at times but this year it was much improved. This improvement may be attributed to the return of Murray Goodwin from Zimbabwe and although he did not score a huge number of runs, his presence and guidance of younger players was a great benefit to the team. Our dominance with the ball continued this season with all bowlers contributing at all times with few teams able to last more than two sessions.

Our batting was consistent and the main reason for its improvement was the contribution from many players. Our top five batsmen all averaged around 30 or above and our two openers, Brett Jones and David Bolton, scored 564 @ 30 and 581 @ 28 respectively which meant that the rest of the top order were rarely exposed to the new ball. Brad Hart had the difficult task of batting in the number three position in Murray's absence. Harty played as his name suggests, with plenty of heart and consequently occupied the crease for long periods of time and always put the team's goals before his own. Stephen Glew won the batting average scoring 649 @ 36 and played some outstanding innings with all the shots. Murray Goodwin batted three all season and played a sensational innings in the semi-final against Scarborough, where he scored 120 against a first class attack to effectively win us the game. Kosta Kapinkoff batted at the number five position for the entire season, averaged 30 which included a fantastic disciplined 100 containing some of the hardest straight hitting I have seen (your straight hitting was okay Clarky). Scott Moody spent a large portion of the season batting in the 'engine room' as it is referred to by the tail but filled in as night watchman on a few occasions and proved that he is no mug with the bat. He scored 342 runs @ 26.3 including a great 80 odd against Scarborough and perhaps Moods' greatest asset is his pride in his wicket.

The remainder of the batting was solid throughout the season with all players contributing, and there were a number of excellent innings during pivotal periods in games from us all.

Our bowling was exceptional this season and because of this fact it made captaincy difficult at times, not in terms of winning games, but getting everyone a bowl to maintain their match readiness. Our pace attack for the vast majority of the season bowled most teams out in two sessions. Before the finals all the seamers were averaging 15 or less with the ball which shows how well they had bowled throughout the season.

Sam Howman bowled into the wind for the majority of the season, opened the bowling on most occasions and swung the ball both ways to capture a lot of top order players. Sam did an excellent job, captured an impressive bag of seven and finished the season with 30 wickets. A great addition to the first grade bowling line up this season was Michael Clark. Having played football at the elite level his competitiveness and experience during heated competition were welcomed. The big left armer in his first season since his schoolboy days snared a convincing 35 wickets at 15 and improved as the season progressed. Phil Henryon cannot go without mention having played all the games up until Christmas, bowling with good pace and control and taking 27 wickets before a side strain finished his season.

Our spin bowling trio of Scott Moody, Brett Jones and Brad Hart all performed exceptionally this season with Jonesy and Harty not bowling as much as their ability suggests, due to the fact that most teams were in disarray before they had the chance to get the ball. Moods, the leg spinner with the full bag of tricks bowled skillfully and had many good batsmen bamboozled by his bowling. It would be safe to say that Moods played the season as our all rounder by completing it with 33 wickets @ 22 and took three unbelievable outfield catches in the semi-final.

Michael Simpson took a club record number of catches finishing with a record number of 47 (one stumping- better not forget that hey Simmo !!). Simmo's leadership and determination were terrific throughout the season and he was always the one to keep us going and on task when the pressure went on. I would like to thank him for doing an outstanding job as captain in my absence and for all his subtle help throughout the year as vice-captain. Thank you mate.

I would like to thank all of the 'quality' blokes that I had the privilege of playing cricket with this season. I have made some great friendships at Subiaco-Floreat. We have achieved something quite remarkable because as you know, 'It is not everyday that you win a premiership'. Thank you all for your support and mateship.

Thanks must go to our coach Noel Knight. Thank you 'Hammer' for showing us the way to the premiership and for the hours that you have put in to help us to our success.

Thank you Phil for scoring so meticulously each week and thank you to John Worland and his committee. Without you people there is no Subi Lions.

Now we know what to do, next season, let's get both trophies !!

2nd GRADE CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The second grade rose from finishing last in the previous season to finishing top of the table at the end of the regular season - eleven wins and two losses. Unfortunately, the semi-final was lost to eventual premiers Melville and third was where the side finished.

The great improvement in the side was due to a number of factors. There was a return to the club of a number of senior players giving the side more depth, there was a more disciplined approach to practice and game day, and also the improved performances of a number of players.

The batting was very consistent throughout the season and rarely was the team dismissed for less than 250. This was highlighted by the batsmen making 4 hundreds and 22 fifties between them. In all six batsmen made more than three hundred runs for the season. The two most outstanding were Daniel Barnes and Tim Beattie, who both batted in the top three and almost always got the team away to a good start. Whilst I am looking forward to a term in the UK, it is with a touch of sadness that I leave the club for a little while. Not just because I think we are on the verge of a very successful era and would like to be a part of that but because I love playing cricket with the people that are the Subi-Floreat Cricket Club. SUBI-FLOREAT'S HISTORY

The Subiaco Cricket Club was admitted to the Western Australian Cricket Association in 1907 and was formed from the remnants of a mercantile cricket club based at Whittaker's timber mill in Subiaco. The Club played originally at Subiaco Oval before re-locating to Rosalie Park in the 1960's. Some of the better known Subiaco players were Johnny Rutherford, Jim Hubble, Des Hoare and a certain R. J. Hawke.

The Floreat Park Cricket Club was founded in 1956 and admitted to the Western Australian Cricket Association as a 2nd Grade Club. The most famous players to be produced by the Floreat Park Club were Australian Test players Kim Hughes and Terry Alderman who both went to the Subiaco Club to play 1st grade cricket before returning to Floreat Oval when the two clubs merged.

The Subiaco-Floreat Cricket Club was founded in 1977 as a result of the amalgamation between the Subiaco Cricket Club and the Floreat Park Cricket Club and commenced playing in the 1977/78 season. Ray Young was the inaugural President and Paul Nicholls the inaugural 1st Grade Captain.
